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# EFPA Review Outcomes Report Communications Plan and Pack

## BACKGROUND:

The State Planning Commission (Commission) is due to release the Outcomes Report (Report) for its inaugural review of the state's Environment and Food Production Areas (EFPA), along with a notice in the Government Gazette and associated communications material.

The Report's release follows the completion of a two-staged review process. The first stage involved an analysis of land supply in Greater Adelaide, which found that there is sufficient provision of land to accommodate housing and employment growth in Greater Adelaide over the next 15 years.

The second stage involved a public consultation process in which land owners and other stakeholders were invited to make submissions regarding any potential anomalies of a trivial nature that may exist in the EFPA boundaries.

In response to the consultation, a total of 90 submissions were received with 30 submissions being verbally supported at a public hearing conducted by the Commission in September 2021.

Overall, the Commission considered 125 sites for potential boundary variations; however, given the limited scope of the legislation to vary boundaries, the Commission found that only three boundary variations from the submissions met the relevant legislated test.

A further 20 minor technical corrections and updates to the boundaries were identified by Planning and Land Use Services (the State's Government's planning department) and endorsed in accordance with this test.

It is expected that the endorsed boundary variations will be carried out in mid-2022 following a process of consideration of the Report and a Gazette notice through State Parliament.

## COMMUNICATION OBJECTIVES

- To inform all stakeholders and the community of the Report release and key findings and provide access to the relevant resources via the PlanSA portal
- To highlight the Commission's key findings from its inaugural EFPA Review and to clarify the limited scope of the review process in context to the limited number of submissions that met the limited scope in the legislation for the Commission to vary the EFPA boundaries (as per test 3).

## POINTS TO CONSIDER

- Both PLUS and the SPC has seen increased scrutiny from both the media and broader community in relation to the Code and planning and development initiatives across the state (both in the introduction/roll-out of the Code itself, and the current Code amendment process; specifically, the Riverbank precinct, Mt. Compass, Climate Change Action Plan, and public consultation process overall)

- Given that only 3 boundary variations from 90 submissions have been considered; a negative response to the consultation is anticipated with community/media potentially viewing the consultation process as a mostly ‘empty gesture’ to tick a box. With this in mind it is recommended that the messaging focus on highlighting the below findings in all external communications.

These variations are summarised as:

- Given the limited scope of the relevant test in the legislation to vary boundaries (*“that the variation is trivial in nature and will address a recognised anomaly”*) the Commission endorsed a total of 23 boundary variations and/or minor technical corrections and administrative updates to boundaries.

## KEY MESSAGES

- The State Planning Commission has completed its first five-year review of South Australia’s EFPA and has released its Review Outcomes Report (Report). As the EFPA provisions of the legislation was operational from April 2017, the review is required to be completed by April 2022.
- The Report’s release follows the completion of a two-staged review process complete (involving a land supply analysis and consultation process), the Report now outlines the outcomes of the Review and must be / has been furnished to the Minister for Planning and Local Government, prior to any variations being made to the boundaries of the EFPA.
- The PDI Act sets out formal procedures for any variations to the boundaries of the EFPA. On 4 June 2021, the Commission released a ‘Statement of Position’ (based on the findings of the Stage 1 Review Report), concluding there is an adequate provision of land in Greater Adelaide to accommodate housing and employment growth over the next 15 years and that the inaugural review would focus on the consideration of variations of the boundary that are trivial in nature and will address a recognised anomaly.
- Given the limited scope of the relevant test in the legislation to vary boundaries (*“that the variation is trivial in nature and will address a recognised anomaly”*) the Commission endorsed 23 boundary variations and/or minor technical corrections and administrative updates to boundaries.
- The proposed boundary variations will be implemented in 2022, including subsequent amendment to the EFPA Overlay in the mapping of the Planning and Design Code and subject to the required legislative steps.
- The next five year anniversary (and associated Review) is due in April 2026.

#### EFPA Review

The State Planning Commission completed its first five-year review into the Environment and Food Production Areas (EFPAs) in November 2021.

The EFPAs were established in 2017 as part of South Australia's new planning system and were introduced to help protect our prime food and wine regions from urban encroachment by supporting sustainable growth in Greater Adelaide's existing urban footprint where supporting infrastructure already exists.

The EFPA is required to undergo statutory review every 5 years under the *Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016* with the first review due to be completed by 2022.

Local Government Areas currently covered by the EFPAs include the Adelaide Hills, Adelaide Plains, Alexandrina, Burnside, Campbelltown, Light Regional, Mitcham, Mid-Murray, Mount Barker, Murray Bridge, Playford, Salisbury, Tea Tree Gully, Victor Harbor and Yankalilla. Barossa and Onkaparinga are covered by the Character Preservation Districts.

The outcomes of the Character Preservation Districts Review, completed in 2018, was an important input into the EFPA review.

The EFPA review comprised a two-staged review process. The first stage involved an analysis of land supply in Greater Adelaide, which found that there is sufficient provision of land to accommodate housing and employment growth in Greater Adelaide over the next 15 years.

The second stage involved nine weeks of public consultation (4 June to 6 August 2021), in which all South Australians were invited to make submissions and have their say regarding potential anomalies of a trivial nature that may exist in the EFPA boundaries.

The Commission delivered its 'EFPA Review Outcomes Report' on **Insert Date** 2021. Given the limited scope of the relevant test in the legislation to vary boundaries ("*that the variation is trivial in nature and will address a recognised anomaly*") the Commission endorsed 23 boundary variations and/or minor technical corrections and administrative updates to boundaries.

The proposed boundary variations will be implemented in 2022, including subsequent amendment to the EFPA Overlay in the Planning and Design Code, subject to the required legislative steps.

The next five year anniversary (and associated Review) is due in April 2026.

### **State Planning Commission completes first review of Environment and Food Production Areas**

The State Planning Commission (Commission) has released its Report for the inaugural review of the state's Environment and Food Production Areas (EFPA).

The EFPA was brought into operation in April 2017 under the *Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016* (the Act), with the Commission required to review the EFPA every 5 years.

The review was undertaken in two stages with the first stage involving an analysis of land supply in Greater Adelaide, which found that there is an adequate provision of land to accommodate housing and employment growth in Greater Adelaide over the next 15 years.

The second stage involved a nine week public consultation process in which land owners and other stakeholders were invited to make submissions regarding potential anomalies of a trivial nature that may exist in the EFPA boundaries.

A total of 90 submissions were received during the consultation process, with 30 of these being heard at a public hearing conducted by the Commission in September 2021.

The Commission gave consideration to all submissions for potential boundary variation, which were measured against the review's scope (as defined in the Commission's Statement of Position, released in June 2021).

Given the limited scope of the relevant test in the legislation to vary boundaries (*“that the variation is trivial in nature and will address a recognised anomaly”*) the Commission endorsed 23 boundary variations and/or minor technical corrections and administrative updates to boundaries.

The proposed boundary variations will be implemented in 2022, including subsequent amendment to the EFPA Overlay in the Planning and Design Code, subject to the required legislative steps.

The next five year anniversary (and associated Review) is due in April 2026.

### **State Planning Commission releases inaugural Environment and Food Production Areas Review Report**

The State Planning Commission (Commission) has today released its Report into the inaugural review of the state’s Environment and Food Production Areas (EFPA).

The Report, which is now available on the PlanSA portal and Commission website, was prepared following a two-staged review process involving a land supply analysis and an nine-week public consultation process.

Newly appointed Commission Chair, Craig Holden said: “I’m pleased to confirm that in addition to outlining the outcomes of the Review, the Report signifies the completion of the first ever review of the EFPA. We would like to thank our stakeholders and the South Australian community; especially those residing and working within the EFPA for their invaluable input into the first ever review of our State’s invaluable food producing and rural areas. The significant feedback we received, played a crucial role in informing the review process and in subsequent key findings.”

The EFPA Review focused on addressing variations to the EFPA boundaries identified as anomalies and/or trivial (minor) in nature.

“Given the limited scope of the relevant test in the legislation to vary boundaries, the Commission has endorsed 23 boundary variations and/or minor technical corrections and administrative updates to boundaries,” said Mr Holden.

The Commission has finalised its recommendations in the Report under section 7(9) of the Act, which has been furnished to the Minister for Planning and Local Government.

The proposed boundary variations will be implemented in 2022, including subsequent amendment to the EFPA Overlay in the Planning and Design Code, subject to the required legislative steps.

The EFPA was brought into operation in April 2017 under the *Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016* (the Act), requiring the Commission to review the EFPA ever 5 years. The next five year Review is due in April 2026.
